

## Memorandum 2021-46

**Fish and Game Law: Cumulative Draft**

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In this study, the Commission<sup>1</sup> has been directed by the Legislature to consider revision of the Fish and Game Code in order to make technical improvements to that law, without making any significant substantive change to the effect of the law.<sup>2</sup>

In December 2018 the Commission approved a tentative recommendation that would recodify the existing Fish and Game Code in a proposed new Fish and Wildlife Code.<sup>3</sup> After releasing the tentative recommendation, the Commission decided to divide public comment into two phases.<sup>4</sup> Phase One would consist of comments on revisions to the text of existing law. Phase Two would address the proposed organizational changes.

Thereafter, the Commission decided to include proposed revisions to the text of existing law based on consideration of Phase One comments in a final recommendation to the Legislature to revise the *existing* Fish and Game Code.<sup>5</sup>

The Commission has been considering these proposed revisions in a series of memoranda that present the revisions in categories defined by the nature of the comments on the revision. Three of the categories present revisions that the staff recommends remain at least under consideration for inclusion in this final recommendation.

The first of these categories are revisions that are supported in principle by at least one Phase One commenter, with no commenter opposing the change.<sup>6</sup> When a presented revision in this category is tentatively approved by the

Commission for inclusion in the contemplated final recommendation, the revision is added to a cumulative draft of approved revisions, the latest of which is attached as an Exhibit to this memorandum.

The second and third categories of presented revisions that the staff has recommended should remain candidates for inclusion in the final recommendation are revisions that, for reasons described in the presenting memorandum, require further discussion with the commenting entities.<sup>7</sup>

To assist commenters in keeping track of revisions in these two categories once they appear in presented memoranda, these revisions are listed in a cumulative table appended to each cumulative draft.<sup>8</sup> As the Commission has directed that this table be constructed in a manner that would best provide this assistance to commenters, commenters are invited to contact Commission staff with any request that would facilitate their use of this table.

## PROPOSED LEGISLATION

**Staff Note.** The proposed changes reflected in this cumulative draft have been provisionally approved by the Commission for inclusion in a draft recommendation that would propose multiple revisions of the Fish and Game Code.

**Comments.** A draft of an official Commission “Comment,” which would be included in any final recommendation, follows each revised code section in the cumulative draft. Courts have routinely held that the Commission’s Comments are evidence of legislative intent with regard to any legislation that implements a Commission recommendation.

The Commission welcomes public comment on any issue relating to the content of this draft or any other aspect of this study.

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PROPOSED LEGISLATION

FISH AND GAME CODE

1 **Fish & Game Code § 70 (amended). “Resident”**

2 SEC. \_\_\_\_\_. Section 70 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

3 70. “Resident” means any person who has resided continuously in the State of  
4 California for six months or more immediately prior to the date of his application  
5 for a license or permit, any person on active military duty with the Armed Forces of  
6 the United States or auxiliary branch thereof, or any person enrolled in the Job Corps  
7 established pursuant to Section 2883 of Title 29 of the United States Code.

8 **Comment.** Section 70 is amended to make the section gender neutral.

9 **Fish & Game Code § 398 (amended). Falconry**

10 SEC. \_\_\_\_\_. Section 398 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

11 398. The base year for determining the inflationary index applied to the fee  
12 established by Section 396 shall be the 1984–85 fiscal year, ~~and the base year for~~  
13 ~~determining the inflationary index to be applied to the fee established by Section~~  
14 ~~397 shall be the 1985–86 fiscal year.~~

15 **Comment.** Section 398 is amended to delete obsolete material.

16 **Fish & Game Code § 456 (amended). Deer management**

17 SEC. \_\_\_\_\_. Section 456 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

18 456. The department shall biennially report to the Legislature and to the Fish and  
19 Game Commission on the progress that is being made toward the restoration and  
20 maintenance of California’s deer herds. ~~The first report shall be submitted on or~~  
21 ~~before October 1, 1989.~~ The report shall include program activities regarding deer  
22 habitat, particularly addressing problems dealing with identification and  
23 preservation of critical deer habitat areas; the amount of revenue derived from the  
24 sale of deer tags during the two previous fiscal years; a list of expenditures during  
25 the two previous fiscal years and proposed expenditures during the current fiscal  
26 year; and a report of general benefits accrued to the deer resources as a result of the  
27 program.

28 **Comment.** Section 456 is amended to delete obsolete material.

29 **Fish & Game Code § 711 (amended). Statement of legislative intent regarding funding**

30 SEC. \_\_\_\_\_. Section 711 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

31 711. (a) It is the intent of the Legislature to ensure adequate funding from  
32 appropriate sources for the department. To this end, the Legislature finds and  
33 declares that:

1 (1) The costs of nongame fish and wildlife programs shall be provided annually  
2 in the Budget Act by appropriating money from the General Fund, through nongame  
3 user fees, and sources other than the Fish and Game Preservation Fund to the  
4 department for these purposes.

5 (2) The costs of commercial fishing programs shall be provided out of revenues  
6 from commercial fishing landing fees, license fees, and other revenues, from  
7 reimbursements and federal funds received for commercial fishing programs, and  
8 other funds appropriated by the Legislature for this purpose.

9 (3) The costs of hunting and sportfishing programs shall be provided out of  
10 hunting and sportfishing revenues and reimbursements and federal funds received  
11 for hunting and sportfishing programs, and other funds appropriated by the  
12 Legislature for this purpose. These revenues, reimbursements, and federal funds  
13 shall not be used to support commercial fishing programs, free hunting and fishing  
14 license programs, or nongame fish and wildlife programs.

15 (4) The costs of managing lands managed by the department and the costs of  
16 wildlife management programs shall be supplemented out of revenues in the Native  
17 Species Conservation and Enhancement Account in the Fish and Game Preservation  
18 Fund.

19 (5) Hunting, sportfishing, and sport ocean fishing license fees shall be adjusted  
20 annually to an amount equal to that computed pursuant to Section 713. However, a  
21 substantial increase in the aggregate of hunting and sportfishing programs shall be  
22 reflected by appropriate amendments to the sections of this code that establish the  
23 base sport license fee levels. The inflationary index provided in Section 713 shall  
24 not be used to accommodate a substantial increase in the aggregate of hunting and  
25 sportfishing programs.

26 (6) The costs of a conservation and mitigation banking program, including, but  
27 not limited to, costs incurred by the department during its adoption of guidelines  
28 for, and the review, approval, establishment, monitoring, and oversight of, banks,  
29 shall be reimbursed from revenues of conservation and mitigation bank application  
30 fees imposed pursuant to Sections 1798.5, 1798.6, and 1799.

31 (b) The director and the Secretary of the Natural Resources Agency, with the  
32 department's annual budget submittal to the Legislature, shall submit a report on the  
33 fund condition, including the expenditures and revenue, for all accounts and  
34 subaccounts within the Fish and Game Preservation Fund. The department shall also  
35 update its cost allocation plan to reflect the costs of program activities.

36 (c) For purposes of this ~~article~~ section, "substantial increase" means an increase  
37 in excess of 5 percent of the Fish and Game Preservation Fund portion of the  
38 department's current year support budget, excluding cost-of-living increases  
39 provided for salaries, staff benefits, and operating expenses.

40 **Comment.** Subdivision (c) of Section 711 is amended to provide greater specificity without  
41 changing the substance of the provision.

1 **Fish & Game Code § 2014 (amended). Damages**

2 SEC. \_\_\_\_\_. Section 2014 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

3 2014. (a) It is the policy of this state to conserve its natural resources and to  
4 prevent the willful or negligent destruction of birds, mammals, fish, reptiles, or  
5 amphibia.

6 (b) The state may recover damages in a civil action against any person or local  
7 agency which unlawfully or negligently takes or destroys any bird, mammal, fish,  
8 reptile, or amphibian protected by the laws of this state.

9 ~~(b)~~ (c) The measure of damages is the amount ~~which~~ that will compensate for all  
10 the detriment proximately caused by the taking or destruction of the birds,  
11 mammals, fish, reptiles, or amphibia.

12 ~~(e)~~ (d) An action to recover damages under this section shall be brought in the  
13 name of the people of the state, in a court of competent jurisdiction in the county in  
14 which the cause of action arose. The State Water Resources Control Board shall be  
15 notified of, and may join in, any action brought under this section when the activities  
16 alleged to have caused the destruction of any bird, mammal, fish, reptile, or  
17 amphibian may involve either the unlawful discharge of pollutants into the waters  
18 of the state or other violation of Division 7 (commencing with Section 13000) of  
19 the Water Code.

20 ~~(d)~~ (e) This section does not apply to ~~persons or local agencies engaged in~~  
21 ~~agricultural pest control, to the destruction of fish in irrigation canals or works or~~  
22 ~~irrigation drainages, or to the destruction of birds or mammals killed while~~  
23 ~~damaging crops as provided by law~~ any of the following:

24 (1) Persons or local agencies engaged in agricultural pest control.

25 (2) The destruction of fish in irrigation canals or works, or irrigation drainages.

26 (3) The lawful destruction of a bird or mammal killed while damaging crops.

27 ~~(e)~~ (f) No damages may be recovered against a local agency pursuant to this  
28 section if civil or administrative penalties are assessed against the local agency for  
29 the same detriment pursuant to Division 7 (commencing with Section 13000) of the  
30 Water Code.

31 ~~(f)~~ (g) Any recovery or settlement of money damages, including, but not limited  
32 to, civil penalties, arising out of any civil action filed and maintained by the Attorney  
33 General in the enforcement of this section shall be deposited by the department in  
34 the subaccounts of the Fish and Wildlife Pollution Account in the Fish and Game  
35 Preservation Fund as specified in Section 13011.

36 ~~(g)~~ (h) For purposes of this section, “local agency” includes any city, county, city  
37 and county, district, public authority, or other political subdivision.

38 **Comment.** The second paragraph of subdivision (a) of Section 2014 is amended to designate it  
39 as subdivision (b). All of the subdivisions that follow are redesignated to reflect that change.

40 Newly designated subdivision (c) is amended to make clear that the measure of damages for  
41 unlawful or negligent take or destruction can include the detriment caused by taking, even if the  
42 animal is not destroyed.

43 Newly designated subdivision (e) is amended to eliminate an ambiguous use of the phrase “as  
44 provided by law.”

1 Newly designated subdivision (f) is amended to make clear that the provision applies to both  
2 judicial and administrative penalties.

3 **Fish & Game Code § 2021 (amended). Shark fin**

4 SEC. \_\_\_\_\_. Section 2021 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

5 2021. (a) As used in this section “shark fin” means the raw, dried, or otherwise  
6 processed detached fin, or the raw, dried, or otherwise processed detached tail, of  
7 an elasmobranch.

8 (b) Except as otherwise provided in subdivisions (c), (d), and (e), it shall be  
9 unlawful for any person to possess, sell, offer for sale, trade, or distribute a shark  
10 fin.

11 (c) Any person who holds a license or permit pursuant to Section 1002 may  
12 possess a shark fin or fins consistent with that license or permit.

13 (d) Any person who holds a license or permit issued by the department to take or  
14 land sharks for recreational or commercial purposes may possess a shark fin or fins  
15 consistent with that license or permit.

16 ~~(e) Before January 1, 2013, any restaurant may possess, sell, offer for sale, trade,  
17 or distribute a shark fin possessed by that restaurant, as of January 1, 2012, that is  
18 prepared for consumption.~~

21 SEC. \_\_\_\_\_. Section 2021.5 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

22 2021.5. (a) Notwithstanding Section 2021, all of the following provisions apply:

23 (1) Any person who holds a license or permit issued by the department to take or  
24 land sharks for recreational or commercial purposes may possess, including for  
25 purposes of consumption or taxidermy, or may donate to a person licensed or  
26 permitted pursuant to Section 1002, a shark fin or fins consistent with that license  
27 or permit.

28 ~~(2) Before July 1, 2013, any person may possess, sell, offer for sale, trade, or  
29 distribute a shark fin possessed by that person, as of January 1, 2012.~~

30 ~~(3) Nothing in Section 2021 prohibits the sale or possession of a shark carcass,  
31 skin, or fin for taxidermy purposes pursuant to Section 3087.~~

32 (b) (1) The Ocean Protection Council shall submit an annual report to the  
33 Legislature that lists any shark species that have been independently certified to  
34 meet internationally accepted standards for sustainable seafood, as defined in

2 SEC. \_\_\_\_\_. Section 2124 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

3 2124. (a) The department may reimburse eligible local entities, pursuant to a  
4 memorandum of understanding entered into pursuant to this section, for costs  
5 incurred by the eligible local entities in the administration and enforcement of any  
6 provision concerning the possession of, handling of, care for, or holding facilities  
7 provided for, a wild animal enumerated in or designated pursuant to Section 2118.

8 (b) The department may enter into memorandums of understanding with eligible  
9 local entities for the administration and enforcement of any provision concerning  
10 the possession of, handling of, care for, or holding facilities provided for, a wild  
11 animal enumerated in or designated pursuant to Section 2118.

12 (c) The commission shall adopt regulations that establish specific criteria an  
13 eligible local entity shall meet in order to qualify as an eligible local entity.

22 SEC. \_\_\_\_\_. Section 2125 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

23 2125. (a) In addition to any other penalty provided by law, any person who  
24 violates this chapter or any regulations implementing this chapter, is subject to a  
25 civil penalty of not less than five hundred dollars (\$500) nor more than ten thousand  
26 dollars (\$10,000) for each violation. Except as otherwise provided, any violation of  
27 this chapter or of any regulations implementing this chapter is a misdemeanor  
28 punishable by imprisonment in a county jail for not more than six months, or by a  
29 fine of not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

30 (b) The Attorney General, or the city attorney of the city or the district attorney or  
31 county counsel of the county in which a violation of this article occurs, may bring a  
32 civil action to recover the civil penalty in subdivision (a) and the costs of seizing

39 subdivision (a), the reasonable costs of investigation, reasonable attorney’s fees, and  
40 reasonable expert witness’ fees may also be recovered and those amounts shall be  
41 credited to the same operating funds as those from which the expenditures for those  
42 purposes were derived.

1 (d) (1) If an animal is confiscated because the animal was kept in contravention  
2 of this chapter or any implementing regulations, the person claiming the animal shall  
3 pay to the department or the new custodian of the animal an amount sufficient to  
4 cover all reasonable expenses expected to be incurred in caring for and providing  
5 for the animal for at least 30 days, including, but not limited to, the estimated cost  
6 of food, medical care, and housing.

7 (2) If the person claiming the animal fails to comply with the terms of ~~his or her~~  
8 their permit and to regain possession of the animal by the expiration of the first 30-  
9 day period, the department may euthanize the animal or place the animal with an  
10 appropriate wild animal facility at the end of the 30 days, unless the person claiming  
11 the animal pays all reasonable costs of caring for the animal for a second 30-day  
12 period before the expiration of the first 30-day period. If the permittee is still not in  
13 compliance with the terms of the permit at the end of the second 30-day period, the  
14 department may euthanize the animal or place the animal in an appropriate wild  
15 animal facility.

16 (3) The amount of the payments described in paragraphs (1) and (2) shall be  
17 determined by the department, and shall be based on the current reasonable costs to  
18 feed, provide medical care for, and house the animal. If the person claiming the  
19 animal complies with the terms of ~~his or her~~ their permit and regains possession of  
20 the animal, any unused portion of the payments required pursuant to paragraphs (1)  
21 and (2) shall be returned to the person claiming the animal no later than 90 days  
22 after the date on which the person regains possession of the animal.

25 The section is also amended to make it gender neutral.

26 **Fish & Game Code § 2126 (amended). Prohibited take**

27 SEC. \_\_\_\_. Section 2126 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

28 2126. (a) Except as otherwise authorized by this code or regulations made  
29 pursuant thereto, it is unlawful for any person to take any mammal ~~as identified by~~  
30 enumerated in or designated pursuant to Section 2118.

31 (b) This section does not prohibit the euthanasia of a mammal as appropriately  
32 directed by a licensed veterinarian or animal health technician.

33 **Comment.** Subdivision (a) of Section 2126 is amended to conform to statutory language used in  
34 other code sections referring to animals listed in Section 2118. See Sections 2123, 2185, 2190.

35 **Fish & Game Code § 2127 (amended). Eligible local entity**

36 SEC. \_\_\_\_. Section 2127 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

37 2127. (a) The department may reimburse eligible local entities, pursuant to a  
38 memorandum of understanding entered into pursuant to this section, for costs  
39 incurred by the eligible local entities in the administration and enforcement of any  
40 provision concerning the possession of, handling of, care for, or holding facilities  
41 provided for, a wild animal enumerated in or designated pursuant to Section 2118.

1 (b) The department may enter into memorandums of understanding with eligible  
2 local entities for the administration and enforcement of any provision concerning  
3 the possession of, handling of, care for, or holding facilities provided for, a wild

19 establishment of standards of performance for administration and enforcement,  
20 which shall include, but are not limited to, requiring that the eligible local entity  
21 possess a knowledge of humane wild animal training methods.

22 (c) The committee shall make recommendations to the director as to the frequency  
23 of inspections necessary for the enforcement and administration of any provision  
24 concerning the possession of, handling of, care for, or holding facilities provided

1 **Fish & Game Code § 2582 (amended). Administrative penalties for specified conduct**

2 SEC. \_\_\_\_\_. Section 2582 of the Fish and Game Code is amended to read:

3 2582. (a) The department may impose ~~civil liability~~ an administrative penalty  
4 upon any person pursuant to this chapter for any of the following acts done for profit  
5 or personal gain:

6 (1) Unlawfully export, import, transport, sell, possess, receive, acquire, or  
7 purchase, or unlawfully assist, conspire, or aid in the importing, exporting,  
8 transporting, sale, possession, receiving, acquisition, or purchasing of, any bird,  
9 mammal, amphibian, reptile, or fish which are taken or possessed in violation of this  
10 code or the regulations adopted pursuant to this code.

11 (2) Unlawfully export, import, transport, sell, possess, receive, acquire, or  
12 purchase, or unlawfully assist, conspire, or aid in the importing, exporting,  
13 transporting, sale, possession, receiving, acquisition, or purchasing of any plants,  
14 insects, or other species listed pursuant to the California Endangered Species Act  
15 (Chapter 1.5 (commencing with Section 2050)), which are taken or possessed in  
16 violation of this code or the regulations adopted pursuant to this code.

17 (3) Unlawfully export, import, transport, sell, possess, receive, acquire, or  
18 purchase any bird, mammal, amphibian, reptile, or fish, or any endangered or  
19 threatened species, or any fully protected bird, mammal, or fish which has been  
20 taken, possessed, transported, or sold in violation of this code or the regulations  
21 adopted pursuant to this code.

22 (4) Unlawfully possess any bird, mammal, amphibian, reptile, or fish, or any  
23 endangered or threatened species, or any fully protected bird, mammal, or fish  
24 which has been taken, possessed, transported, or sold in violation of this code or any  
25 regulations adopted pursuant to this code within the maritime and territorial  
26 jurisdiction of the state or within the portions of the special maritime jurisdiction of  
27 the United States upon which the State of California exercises concurrent  
28 jurisdiction, either by statute, deputization, or by contract with the United States.

29 (5) Having exported, imported, transported, sold, purchased, or received any bird,  
30 mammal, amphibian, reptile, or fish, or any endangered or threatened species, or  
31 any fully protected bird, mammal, or fish, unlawfully make or submit any false  
32 record, account, label, or identification thereof.
